**RCIA - JOURNEY IN FAITH** The programme recommences on Wed 26<sup>th</sup> February, at 7pm in the office at St Mary's Chippenham. Please keep in your prayers those from both our parishes who journey to Baptism at the Easter Vigil, together with those to be received into the full communion of the Catholic Church.

**THE RITE OF ELECTION** takes place in our Cathedral at 11am on Saturday 8 March. On this first Saturday of Lent, as at the start of every Lent, our diocesan family will gather at the cathedral together with our bishop to celebrate the Rite of Election, where those who are journeying towards becoming part of our Catholic community are presented to Bishop Bosco. Here family and friends, sponsors and godparents, will join with those preparing for Baptism (catechumens) and those preparing to be received into full communion with the Catholic Church (candidates) as they come to this stage of their journey towards reception of the sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist. The witness that these candidates and catechumens give in taking this brave step is always an inspiration to those who come to pray for them and to support them in their journey. It is also a reminder of our own call to continual conversion of our hearts and our lives. Please do join our diocesan family as we welcome to attend!

**THE SEASON OF LENT** A reminder that Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, 5<sup>th</sup> March. Mass at Corsham 12pm and 6pm at Chippenham that day with the Imposition of Ashes. This is a day of fasting and abstinence. This means taking no more than one full meal, and one or two light collations (snacks) in order to sustain strength. Abstinence means abstaining from eating meat. The rules of fasting and abstinence apply to those over 14 years for abstinence, and those between the ages of 18 and 60 for fasting. The only other day of full fast and abstinence is Good Friday.

### FIRST HOLY COMMUNION FOR CORSHAM & CHIPPENHAM The

next session for children is Sat 1<sup>st</sup> March at 4pm. The most important part of preparation for the first Holy Communion is the weekly celebration of Sunday Mass each week. ### THE WORD THIS WEEK

THE SEVENTH SUNDAY OF THE YEAR (C)

### **First reading**

### 1 Samuel 26:2, 7-9, 12-13, 22-23

In those days: Saul arose and went down to the wilderness of Ziph with three thousand chosen men of Israel to seek David in the wilderness of Ziph.

David and Abishai went to the army by night. And there lay Saul sleeping within the encampment, with his spear stuck in the ground at his head, and Abner and the army lay round him. Then Abishai said to David, 'God has given your enemy into your hand this day. Now please let me pin him to the earth with one stroke of the spear, and I will not strike him twice.' But David said to Abishai, 'Do not destroy him, for who can put out his hand against the LORD's anointed and be guiltless?' So David took the spear and the jar of water from Saul's head, and they went away. No man saw it or knew it, nor did any awake, for they were all asleep, because a deep sleep from the LORD had fallen upon them.

Then David went over to the other side and stood far off on the top of the hill, with a great space between them. David said, 'Here is the spear, O king! Let one of the young men come over and take it. The LORD rewards every man for his righteousness and his faithfulness, for the LORD gave you into my hand today, and I would not put out my hand against the LORD's anointed.'
