TODAY IS EVANGELII GAUDIUM SUNDAY This year, the Church has been celebrating a significant anniversary. It's 1,700 years since the Council of Nicaea. This great gathering of Bishops from around the Church began the work to formulate the creed we proclaim Sunday by Sunday. It is the content of this creed that is our mission, so that we may know and love God in this life, in order to be happy with him forever in the next. The creed begins with a profound proclamation, "I believe..." This is the theme for *Evangelii Gaudium Sunday* 2025. You will find resources to help you celebrate this day. The main reflection comes from Abbot Hugh Allen O'Praem, Director of Mission for the Bishops' Conference.

A SECOND COLLECTION will also be taken today to support the work of the Bishops' Conference Mission Directorate.

FEAST OF OUR LADY OF WALSINGHAM Wednesday 24th September. The feast day commemorates the veneration of Mary, under the title of Our Lady of Walsingham. This title is linked to a vision experienced in 1061 by Lady Richeldis de Faverches, who was instructed to build a replica of the Holy House of Nazareth in Walsingham, Norfolk, England. This site became a major pilgrimage destination in medieval England. In 2024, the Vatican elevated the observance of Our Lady of Walsingham from an obligatory memorial to a formal feast day, reflecting its importance in the Church in England and Wales. This change aims to strengthen the devotion to Our Lady of Walsingham and encourage more pilgrims to visit the shrine. Please note that Mass is at 11am on Wednesday and we are joined by children form St Patrick's School.

RCIA - JOURNEY IN FAITH A new programme will start in the Autumn for adults who wish to know Jesus Christ and his Church.

This is for those enquiring about the faith leading to the possibility of Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist (or reception into the full communion of the Church) next Easter. September – The Month of Our Lady of Sorrows



Over the centuries there grew a custom of devoting certain months of the year to specific spiritual themes. September became known as the month of "Our Lady of Sorrows." Initially this might seem like a strange designation, as Our Lady of Sorrows is usually connected to Jesus' crucifixion, which in the Church's liturgical year is celebrated in March or April. However, early on a feast developed on 14 September named "The Exaltation of the Holy Cross." Originally this feast celebrated the finding of the Holy Cross by St Helena and the consecration, on 14 September, 335, of the basilicas built by Constantine on the sites of the Holy Sepulchre and Calvary at Jerusalem. This brought into September a particular meditation on the cross of Jesus Christ, and by the 17th century there developed a complementary Marian feast on 15 September.

In the 17th century the Servites celebrated a solemn feast of the Seven Sorrows of Our Lady, which in 1817 was extended to the whole Church by Pope Pius VII as a memorial of his sufferings in exile and captivity and of his deliverance through the Blessed Virgin's intercession. Furthermore, Pope St Pius X transferred this feast from the third Sunday of September to this octave-day of Our Lady's Nativity (8 September), in 1912." Originally this feast was more concerned with Mary's sufferings throughout her early life, excluding the Passion of Jesus, her Son, but over time it has come to represent all of Mary's suffering.

Collect for Our Lady of Sorrows

O God, who willed that, when your Son was lifted high on the Cross, his Mother should stand close by and share his suffering, grant that your Church, participating with the Virgin Mary in the Passion of Christ, may merit a share in his Resurrection.

Who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever.
